

UNSUNG HEROES OF THE COLD WAR COME TO NKY

Fort Mitchell, KY/August 30, 2006—A military branch that served an important purpose during the Cold War will relive life behind the scenes as members of the Army Security Agency (ASA) reminisce September 13-17 at the Drawbridge Inn.

This ASA unit served in the nation of Turkey from 1955 to 1995 and monitored Soviet military units, satellite and space transmissions. Reunion organizer Elder Green says if it sounds like these military men were smart, it was because they were.

"Most of the men were trained at Fort Devens, Massachusetts. Others received Russian linguistic instruction in Monterey, CA. In order to become part of the ASA, you had to test within the top ten percent of the Army."

While here the nearly 100 visitors will take in local sites such as the Air Force Museum, Hofbrauhaus Newport and BB Riverboats. For more information, contact

Colonel Donald S. Aines regrets that he and Marjorie will not be able to attend the 2006 reunion in Northern Kentucky because of health problems. Colonel Aines wrote his memoirs titled Win, Draw, Lose and will gladly send a copy to any Det 4 veteran who requests a copy. Aines served only 1 year with the ASA and it was at Det 4 where he was the Adjutant and XO. In his book he devotes an entire chapter to his year on the HILL. His year was loaded with events that that not many experienced, such as the Turk guard who was killed at the front gate and the crash of the Det 4 airplane. The commander was Lt Col John Cox who was concerned with the operational mission and left the running of the post to Aines to deal with Col Van Oosten who was the overall commander of ASA troops in Turkey. For additional information search the DOOL's for Aines 15 page write-up of his Det 4 experiences. Aines' memoir covers his military career of nearly 30 years. He saw combat service with the 9th Infantry Division during WWII; the Korean War with the engineering battalion of the 1st Cavalry; a year service with HQ USARV in Vietnam; and 4 years with the 1st Infantry Division in Europe and the U.S.. His final assignment was as chief of the Army Casualty Division during the release of the POW/MIA's at the end of U.S. involvement in Vietnam.



In the above photo Gary Dunnam, Victoria County, Texas Heritage director, presented a timeline of the 1892 Victoria County courthouse during a recent ceremony to unveil the new Texas State historical marker at the intersection of Constitution and Bridge streets, on the southeast corner of the courthouse block. Gary wrote the287 word inscription for the new marker which covers the history of the square from platting in 1824, through the 1849 courthouse and the details of planning and building of the restored 1892 building. The last paragraph reads, "When the need for more space arose in 1961, residents petitioned to save the courthouse and the county built a new facility on the north side of the square. Work at the turn of the 21st Century largely restored the courthouse to its original design."

In an interview, Dunnam said, "The entire courthouse project was completed in the calendar year of 1892. By 1 June they were far enough along for a celebration attended by 7,000 people. The Masons marched around from their lodge on Forrest Street and leveled the cornerstone. They barbecued 34 head of assorted livestock. To view the news accounts – to to:

Feick, fought in the Battle of the Bulge and was one of those ordered by General Eisenhower to witness a Nazi death camp. He was a soldier in the 132d Ordinance Medium Maintenance Company, 84th "Railsplitters" Division and was one of the eye-witnesses at the scene, a few days after the massacre. His Dad wrote in a letter about "a Jewish massacre that took place on a farm near Gardelegen Germany. It was a pitiful sight to see. Many were packed on hay in a large barn and the hay was set on fire as they fired incindiary bullets into it. Many were mowed down with machine gun fire as they stood in line. We calculated almost 1800 bodies in all." According to Feick, the prisoners were "murdered here" in the field. Feick had arrived on the scene after the massacre, but was told by a Polish prisoner, who had survived by hiding under the bodies in the barn, that hundreds of the victims were lined up in the field and machine-gunned to death. On April 18, 1945, German citizens of Gardelegen began digging seven trenches for mass graves on the orders of General Frank A. Keating.

I grew up seeing pictures similar to these and hearing first hand of the Holocaust. Dad's testimony will live on as it is a matter of record. Many of the prisoners were slave laborers, working on high tech projects in Northwestern Germany, not to far from Berlin. Many were burned alive. You see their heads in the doorways where they breathed their last breath.

How many in today's world could comprehend such atrocities? Has America forgotten?

God bless our American Military!



Elder - Sandra and I were glad to finally meet you and Patty at the ASA Picnic. We visited the National Cyrptologic Museum for almost 2 1/2 hours and had a great tour guide (Mr. McConnell).

After arriving at Frankfort, Germany, I thought I was going to have an interesting life in Europe. Then after just a few days of enjoying the nightlife, I was one of the surprised ditty-bobbers who was given a shot, handed a rifle and told to get on a plane. I don't believe I had seen a rifle in 8-9 months. I thought, "Lebanon, here I come". That might have been a better option, as the troops were withdrawn after a few months. Then perhaps, I could have returned to Germany.

Anyway, after arriving in Ankara, a number of us had to ride in a small, narrow bus to Sinup. There was no leg room at all, and it was very hot. It was a long, long, ride. At one point during the ride, we heard a loud creaking sound. We couldn't imagine what was making the sound. After rounding a curve, we saw an ox in a yoke, walking in a circle, pulling a grist mill. We then figured the Turkish people were at east 100 years behind the US.

On the Hill, the duty hours were the best part of the day. The Russians were not very fast, but sometimes hid the sigals next to radio stations. Some nights when we were working mids and traffic was clear and light, we could sit with a leg up on the table on either side of the Mill, drink coffee and smoke cigarettes with one hand and type with the other, and listen to dit-dahs in one ear, and music from the BBC in the other. The attitude was pretty laid back most of the time.

Other times, we might be awakened at night to go and find a signal when they all switched frequencies and they were getting ready to send an ICBM (5,000 miles) or send up a Sputnik.

We all had the Turkey Trots year round. We had unlimited substitution in our softball games. We were always leaving the field and running to an outhouse. Then we would come back and retake our position in the field.

It was a good feeling knowing we were doing something of importance and competing with the Russians. Our ability to copy was a hell of a lot better the their guys. We would often hear . - - - - - from an outpost, asking the sender to repeat, and we had no problem in gettting the message right the first time. After Turkey, I went to Fort Bragg and copied the Cubans. Their signals were very loud but they could send very fast (30-40 wpm). I was very lucky to go TDY to Homestead AFB in the summer of '60. That was a great life, living in two man rooms that were like a hotel. Even better was driving a deuce and a half or three quarter truck into Miami Beach every night. What more could a young single man want.

After completing my three years in the Fall of '60, I went back to college, graduated from Old Dominion University (College then) with a Business Management major. A year later I married my beautiful wife, Sandra and we had two great daughters. I sold life insurance and mutual funds and did estate planning as a career, and played golf whenever possible. We now have three wonderful grandsons whom we see whenever we can.
