They also took frequent hikes and swam laps and exercised at the Hillsboro Aquatic Center every other day and it was nothing for them to take a 50 to 60 mile bike ride around Hagg Lake or to Pumpkin Ridge.

They both enjoyed meeting friends out for dinner. Darrel always appreciated a good joke and was never seen without a smile on his face. Sheryl was a fantastic cook and baker and loved crafts and flower arranging. They lived for their children and grandchildren and were always there for you whenever needed.

# MORRIS, Harold A., (Ham), E7, Det 27, 64-65, DOB: 26 April 1928 DOD 29 June 1990 in Maine

Dear Sir I came across your DOOL web page and am forwarding you a bit of info: Harold A Morris (HAM) was my Uncle and Godfather. He was born in Natick, MA (named after his father who served in the sea bees) on 26 April 1928 and died 29 June 1990 outside of Augusta, Maine at his home of a heart attack. He also did three tours of duty in Vietnam, the last wounding him in a roadside attack. He was in the second jeep with his commanding officer in the first. Next were a couple of the half ton (I think thats what they are called) transport trucks with troops sitting on each side. an explosion in front of the jeep killed the driver

instantly and seriously wounded the commanding officer. The explosion

rendered Harold deaf for the time being. They then shot into the transport

trucks at what would be the soldiers leg level so they were either killed or

unable to walk. Harold said he only knew they were still firing upon them because of the sight of the bullets hitting the dirt. He could not hear the guns. He was able to move his commanding officer and the other wounded into the second jeep and drive them to a base hospital. Because he was in a night recon outfit he was unable to be sedated to have his own wounds cared for until someone came from his outfit to standby. He lost 80% of his hearing in one ear due to the blast and had to retire. He received a purple heart, I believe a silver star and oak leaf clusters along with a medal for valor. He was one of four brothers, each one serving in the army. I wish I could be more specific.. He was married and his family was living in the Cape Cod area (Sandwich, MA) He had a son and daughter, but I've lost contact with them. He divorced in later years and retired in Sandwich, MA. A few years before his death he remarried and moved to Maine where he was taken suddenly by a heart attack while working in his garden one day. I doubt he ever knew what hit him. He is buried in Bourne National Cemetery. I miss him very much. It was so nice to find your web site and find he was remembered by others also. I have many good memories of Harold and can remember writing to him when he was stationed in Turkey Thank you for your service to our country and for your sacrifices to keep us all free. 

A HISTORY LESSON - WHO WAS THE FIRST PRESIDENT? This article was sent to me by Greg Kearney, a former ditty-bopper from Det 4-4 at Karamursel, Turkey. Greg has been a faithful DOOL relayer from the get go.

I'm sure that George Washington was your best guess. After all, no one else comes to mind.

It's a fact that the United States declared its independence in 1776, yet Washington did not take office until 30 April 1789. So who was running the country during these initial years of this young country?

It was the first eight U. S. Presidents. In fact, the first President of the United States was one John Hanson.

I can hear you now - John who? John Hanson, the first President of the United States.

Don't go checking the encyclopedia for this name. He is one of those great men that are lost to history. If you're extremely lucky, you may actually find a brief mention of his name, but that's about it.

The new country was actually formed on March 1, 1781 with the adoption of The Articles of Confederation.

This document was actually proposed on June 11, 1776, but not agreed upon by Congress until November 15, 1777.

Maryland refused to sign this document until Virginia and New York ceded their western lands (Maryland was afraid that these states would gain too much power in the new government from such large amounts of land). Once the signing took place in 1781, a President was needed to run the country.

John Hanson was chosen unanimously by Congress (which included George Washington). In fact, all the other potential candidates refused to run against him, as he was a major player in the revolution and an extremely influential member of Congress.

As the first President, Hanson had quite the shoes to fill. No one had ever been President and the role was poorly defined. His actions in office would set precedent for all future Presidents.

He took office just as the Revolutionary War ended. Almost immediately, the troops demanded to be paid. As would be expected after any long war, there were no funds to meet the salaries. As a result, the soldiers threatened to overthrow the new government and put Washington on the throne as a monarch.

All the members of Congress ran for their lives, leaving Hanson as the only man left running the government. He somehow managed to calm the troops down and hold the country together. If he had failed, the government would have fallen almost immediately and everyone would have been bowing to King Washington.

Hanson, as President, ordered all foreign troops off American soil, as well as the removal of all foreign flags. This was quite the feat, considering the fact that so many European countries had a stake in the United States since the days following Columbus.

Hanson established the Great Seal of the United States, which all Presidents have since been required to use on all official documents.

President Hanson also established the first Treasury Department, the first Secretary of War, and the first Foreign Affairs Department.

Lastly, he declared that the fourth Thursday of every November was to be Thanksgiving Day, which is still true today.

The Articles of Confederation only allowed a President to serve a one year term during any three year period, so Hanson actually accomplished quite a bit in such little time.

Seven other presidents were elected after him -

Elias Boudinot (1782-83), Thomas Mifflin (1783-84), Richard Henry Lee (1784-85), John Hancock (1785-86), Nathan Gorman (1786-87), Arthur St. Clair (1787-88), and Cyrus Griffin (1788-89)

..... all prior to Washington taking office. So what happened? Why don't we hear about the first eight presidents?

It's quite simple - The Articles of Confederation didn't work well. The individual states had too much power and nothing could be agreed upon. A new doctrine

needed to be written - something we know today as the Constitution.

And that leads us to the end of our story. George Washington was not the first President of the United States. He was the first President of the United States under the Constitution we follow today. And the first eight Presidents of this country are forgotten in history.
