VIRGINIA BEACH, VA

Sunday afternoon October 13, 2019 Thru Wednesday evening October 16, 2019

Currently there are twenty-six (26) rooms booked at the Springhill Suites Hotel in VB. That calculates into forty-seven (47) veterans and their partners who have signed up to attend this year's reunion.

REMEMBER, reservations for attendees must be made no later than August 29, 2019. After that date the hotel will release our unreserved rooms back into their general rental system and they have the option to accept reservations at our special rate or at the going sales rate. IMPORTANT, we presently have only eighteen (18) more rooms reserved for our reunion. So don't

wait until the last minute to make your reservation, because you could be paying the going room rate or not have a room.

Vance was stationed at ft. Devens in 1959, then he was stationed at Sinop, Turkey in 1960 and then at Bad Abling, Germany in 1961.

Connie shared some additional information on Vance:

Vance was born December 3, 1936 in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. Carlisle friend Jack Barbieri and Vance enlisted in the Army at the same time and served in Sinop together. Vance made other life-long friends with some of the men he served with at Sinop.

He loved sports (basketball, volley ball, softball, tennis & golf) and when he wasn't participating, he was watching sports on TV. Fishing, planting a vegetable garden and woodworking also occupied his time.

His work in communications first took him to our Embassy in Djakarta followed by Athens, Accra, Prague and Bern. We had a break stateside before one last assignment in England before returning to the states. We moved to Bend thirty years ago.

Vance passed away in Bend, OR on March 28, 2019.



"Reunification: A Monterey Mary Returns to Berlin"

T.H.E. Hill is obviously a pen name, so if you recognize him, don't tell anybody his real name.

T.H.E. Hill, the author of *Voices Under Berlin: The Tale of a Monterey Mary*, served in ASA at Field Station Berlin in the mid-1970s, after a tour at Herzo Base in the late 1960s, following a tour at Fort Meade. Of Turkey, like the character played by James Earl Jones in the movie *The Hunt for Red October*, all he is allowed to say is "I was never here."

He is a three-time graduate of the Defense Language Institute (DLIWC) in Monterey, California, the alumni of which are called "Monterey Marys". The Army taught him to speak Russian, Polish, and Czech; three tours in Germany taught him to speak German, and his wife taught him to speak Dutch. He has been a writer his entire adult life, but now retired, he writes what he wants, instead of the things that others tasked him to write while he was still getting paid. What he has been writing are novels about life in ASA.

VOICES UNDER BERLIN: THE TALE OF A MONTEREY MARY

This is the story of a Monterey Mary ostensibly working the Berlin Tunnel (operation GOLD, covername: PBJointly) in the mid-1950s. it gives you an idea of what it's like to be an ASA transcriber.

The tenth anniversary edition of Voices Under Berlin has some bonus material, including a short story entitled "TUSLOG Det 4" (the U.S. Lunar Operations Group Det 4), which has the tag line "shining Diogenes' lamp on the dark side of the moon."

THE DAY BEFORE THE BERLIN WALL: COULD WE HAVE STOPPED IT? This is the story of a legend that was still being told in Berlin in the 1970s: we had advance intelligence that the East Germans were going to build the Wall and didn't do anything to stop it.

REUNIFICATION: A MONTEREY MARY RETURNS TO BERLIN This is the story of going back to Berlin 35 years after a tour at Field Station Berlin and reliving the memories of that time, while discovering that there was a STASI penetration back then, and ID-ing who it was.

IN THE LAIR OF THE COZY BEAR: CYBERWARFARE WITH APT 29 This is a novel about the Russian cyberspies who hacked the DNC, the White House, the Department of State, the Pentagon, and more, and the Dutch cyberspies who watched them. Original title: In Het Hol Van De Cozy Bear by F.W.A. van Nispen tot Pannerden, translated from the Dutch by T.H.E. Hill.

> As a Lives in the hearts and minds of those who served in it. These novels will help to keep it alive a little longer.

Alas, poor Cold War, I knew it well. It was a war of most infinite jest and fancy, fought more often in the dark corners of the mind than to the death, but the lives of millions hung in the balance. It was a war without battlefields and monuments, but not without casualties. Major "Nick" Nicholson, the last casualty of the Cold War, shot by a soviet sentry in East Germany, was a class mate, and that makes it personal. My thyroid cancer was a wound received in the battle of Chernobyl.

Dick wrote to the editors of the DOOL with is bio:

Tuesday, April 02, 2019

After Basic Training at Fort Jackson, SC I attended Communications Center Specialist training at Fort Gordon, GA. As my graduation day neared, I anxiously awaited my next assignment. I was eager to put all that knowledge to work for our country! I wasn't really sure what all it would involve, but knew it would be interesting work.

Separately my Dad, Chief Master Sergeant Raymond Johnson, was serving in the Air Force Security Service (AFSS). He had recently been assigned to TUSLOG 3-2 at Samsun, Turkey. As soon as I received my orders, I went straight to a map of Turkey to see how close Sinop was to Samsun. Imagine my excitement to find that it was about 100 miles away! I wrote to my Dad and told him that I was going to be stationed in Turkey at Sinop and gave him my arrival date.

The flight to Ankara on Pan Am airlines was a long one stop trip. Upon arrival in Ankara, we (me and my buddy, Tom Ruger) were met and placed in a hotel for one night. We were told that we would be taking the Turkish equivalent of Greyhound from Ankara to Sinop. Next day, we were off on the bus trip from hell. Departure was delayed until late afternoon, so most of the trip over washboard dirt roads was at night. There were a couple of stops; one for food and a potty break, the other for just a potty break. I didn't eat anything, because I had no idea what they heck they were eating. Tom and I decided to buy two bottles of Raki and make do with that. Mistake! We were rather hung over when we arrived in Samsun the next morning.



Dick and his Father (CMSgt) the day Dick departed Turkey. Samsun, Turkey !967 As soon as we were off the bus, I called up to the base and asked for CMSgt. Johnson. When Dad answered I told him we were in Samsun at the bus station. He said he'd have a Jeep there in 15 minutes to pick us up. We had a great visit and at the end of the day, Dad called the First Sergeant in Sinop and asked if he could keep us in Samsun for a couple of days.

Since Det. 3-2 was the repair station for some of Sinop's critical gear and Dad was NCOIC the Precision Measurement Electronics Lab (PMEL) and repair shop, agreement was quickly reached. After a couple of days, we were flown on the mail plane (a U1A Otter) from Samsun to Sinop to begin our tour. Thankfully, we did not have to endure the bus trip from Samsun to Sinop!

Dad and I got to visit each other on several occasions, going back and forth on the mail plane. Sometimes, I'd escort secret gear down for repair and stay a day or so until it was fixed.

My tour was up after 11 months and 10 days, so I departed before Dad.

End

I've enclosed a couple of pictures. The first is of my during the blizzard of the winter of 1966. The other is of me and my Dad the day I departed Turkey for my next duty station at Two Rock Ranch Station. And one of me deer hunting in South Ga. My wife, Donna and I hope to attend the reunion in October, but our 7th grandson is due early that month, so we will have to see.

April 28, 2019

Merahaba All,

Dean asked me to let everyone know how I was doing health-wise.

I recently had a pacemaker installed and I am now doing well. If I can get past all these follow up appointments.

I was scheduled for an outpatient surgery with my urologist and had to go for an EKG before the procedure. It turned out that my heart rate was in the mid 30's. So that surgery was cancelled and followed by two weeks of wearing a monitor. The monitor showed my heart stopped beating several times on a couple of nights for 7-8 seconds.

Next came the hospital visit and the pacemaker. I am feeling great now and almost back to my normal activities. We hope to see you all in Virginia Beach in September. Best Wishes to all of you.

Jim sent us an interesting bio on himself.

Sunday, March 31, 2019 I joined the Army on August 27, 1961, and honorably discharged on August 27, 1964.

I took basic training at Ft. Jackson South Carolina until the early part of November 1961. I then went to Ft. Gordon Georgia for school as a 722 (Cryptographer). In February 1962, I then went on to Sinop Turkey (Det 4) via New Jersey, Frankfurt Germany, Vienna Austria, Istanbul Turkey, and Site 23 just outside Ankara Turkey. I was at Det 4 until February 1963 via truck convoy. The 2-1/2 were covered in plywood and traveled from site 23 to Samsun Turkey where we spent the night at an Air Force installation. This trip was through the Turkish mountains, snow and all, without the benefit of ANY heat in the back of the trucks. Sandwiches, milk, and juice froze, and we had to put them inside our field jacket and top coats to thaw and then consume. I was there during the Cuban missile crises. Tense to say the least! After Sinop in February 1963 I was shipped to Vint Hill Farms Station in Warrenton Virginia and discharged on August 28, 1964. I was promoted to SP/4 while at Vint Hill in August 1963.

3/8/2019 6:05

I began "The Mauler" in 1962, just before flying back to the states (with NO accrued leave time) and thanks to Major Hutchinson (head of S-2 at the time), I received 2 weeks of "advanced" leave (unheard of, I know) to fly home to Bakersfield, CA. and get married. Pat, my new wife (and later first kindergarten teacher at Manzarali), and I found an apartment in Ankara and spent our first 10 months together in Kavakladeri (probably misspelled).

Unfortunately, I had a position in HQ company with no chance for promotion so, within months, I was transferred to the post dispensary, working under Captain James Derby, our post M.D. It was great duty, but I did have to give up "The Mauler".

My wife and I had some terrific adventures in Turkey and I have never regretted the time I spent at Site 23.

I entered the Army in April of 1972 (as my lottery draft number was "21"). I spent Basic and AIT at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri (only 50 miles from my hometown!) For reasons unknown, during AIT, I was approached by ASA Office at Fort Wood if I had considered joining the Army Security Agency. (I think the word they used was being ... "attached" to ASA...). They asked me some questions about my personal life, etc. and told me I would have to go through a process of getting a security clearance. I was held in AIT during the security clearance process; and in the meantime, I did administrative jobs around the Fort. It seemed the process took forever!

Then one day in November, 1972 I was called into the ASA Office and they said "... you're going to (Sinop) Turkey....". Needless to say, I was shocked!

Sinop was my only tour of duty. I arrived on "The Hill" in December of 1972 and left in December of 1973. Because Sinop was considered a "hardship tour" and I only had 3-4 months left on my active military duty, I was given an early out. I do not know the exact date but I do have a copy of my DD 214 which shows my exact ETS date from the service.

- D. Touring the City of Norfolk Sites & Area Nauticus Complex, the Battleship Wisconsin, the Waterside District, cruise on the "Victory Rover" on a naval themed vessel, visit the MacArthur Memorial – 9:00 to 4:00 \$75.00/person

Tour sites synopsis:

Tour A

Depart via motor coach for the charming town of Williamsburg. Your tour guide will provide interesting and informative narration during the ride about the historic Virginia Peninsula and the Coastal Virginia area.



Experience a full day touring this living museum, with admission ticket providing entry into the many exhibition buildings, including the Capitol and the Governor's Palace. See the introductory film, "Story of a Patriot", tour historic homes, public buildings and 18th century craft shops where costumed hosts recreate the sights and sounds of America 200 years ago.

Guests will also enjoy free time to shop and browse in the many unique specialty shops in Merchants Square. High quality apparel, gifts, jewelry, beautiful furniture and holiday decorations are but a few of the offerings found in this quaint, picturesque shopping area. Guests may enjoy lunch on their own in one of the Colonial Taverns or in Merchants Square. The guide will point out all the dining options as you pass through town.

TOUR B
