NEWS ABOUT THE 2009 ASA TURKEY REUNION

One of the things I frequently hear is that there is not enough time to do this or that. I too have that problem trying to plan for the 2009 reunion. The over-riding purpose for holding the ASA Turkey reunions is to perpetuate the bonds crafted among those who have served in Turkey. The attendance in 2008 was 27 vet's, the lowest yet since the Reunions were established in 2001 at Fort Devens. The 2002 reunion at Hershey, PA., by far, was the most attended reunion with 73 vet's in attendance. Next best was at San Antonio in 2005 with 48, followed by 47 at Myrtle Beach in 2007; 42 in 2006 at Northern KY, then 38 in 2004 at Huntsville and 35 at 7 Springs in 2003.

Patty and I are doing our level best to find and sign a contract for 2009. It appears that the Hagerstown, MD locale is doomed over contract language that we simply will not agree to. We made an offer and am sticking to it. Now the ball is in their corner. 

I'm Jill Boldway from the class of 1970, and I attended George C. Marshall High School in Ankara, Turkey, in 1967 and 1968, and I'd like to tell you a story about a hero among us, with whom I was reunited at the 2005 Reunion in Dallas.

In 1968, at the age of 16, a serious crime was committed against me by three students from our school that has affected me my whole life. I was attacked, beaten, and thrown into the street in front of an oncoming bus. Another fellow student saved my life that day. Without a thought for his own safety, he ran in front of the bus, waving his arms at the driver, and stopped the bus just in time. The front tire had stopped on my hair, inches away from crushing my head. The trauma of the event was so great that I actually went out of my body and was floating above the scene where I watched my 17-year-old friend run out in front of the bus to save me. That brave teenager has been my hero throughout my life, yet he spent most of his life regretting that he hadn't done enough to stop the attack.

At the time, we were both living on Site 23 (Manzarali Station) where my father was one of the senior officers of the post (Maj. Francis W. Boldway, U.S. Army). I wasn't liked because I was an officer's daughter, even though I had done special things for the teens there, like securing an unused building on the post and fixing it up to use as a teen center. In spite of that, on a daily basis, I was bullied, cajoled, spit on, called every dirty name in the book, had things thrown at me and my clothes torn, and was tormented by many of the teens that lived on Site 23 who attended our school. The long ride to school was hell for me. My only relief was when we finally arrived at school and I had my friends and classes to give me a reason to believe that life was still worth living. I was a cheerleader then, and it gave me some sense of self-worth. I especially enjoyed cheering for the one and only football game we had – the Juniors against the Seniors. Little did I know that one of those football players would one day save my life.

32 years later, I was reunited on the phone with my hero and I was finally able to tell him that I knew he had saved my life. He was able to fill me in on what happened as I had blocked most of it from my mind all those years. He saved me again when he filled in the blanks and told me about the good times that we had together - memories I had completely buried since the attack. I had spent my whole life with hardly any memories of my time in Ankara, Turkey, and very few memories of my days at George C. Marshall High School. Hearing those stories began to heal the pain I had been carrying inside all these years.

I decided to attend the 2005 reunion in Dallas to further my healing and to perhaps recapture some of the lost good feelings by being with long-ago classmates with whom I once shared this foreign adventure; to reunite with my hero after 37 years; to thank my hero in person for saving my life; and, finally, to share this story. The story of a hero - my hero - from the class of 1968, Michael Wade Posthuma. Michael, because of you, I've had a wonderful life. Because of your bravery, my 33-year-old son is alive, my beautiful 6-year-old granddaughter, Kyla, is alive, and my grandson, Cooper, is about to be born. Thank you. You are a hero!

Mike told Jill that the two girls and one boy, along with their families, were sent back to the United States and the fathers were demoted. [I don't believe that that statement is true]. Jill has only a vague memory of men coming to her home on Site 23 and asking her questions.

Jill told us, "Mike has been very helpful in filling in the holes in my memory and has provided me with good stories of the fun times we had as I had forgotten everything. He's been a blessing."

CAMBELL, Charles K DOB: 18JN1917, DOD: 28OC2007 at Mayo, Anne Arundel Co., MD, CPT-Maj, Sig C., Cdr Det 27, 57-58. Name submitted by Maurice Cammack. I chatted with the retired Major on 4 July 2002 when he lived in Modoc, SC. He informed

that he served only one (unhappy) Tour of Duty with ASA and that was as CDR of Det 27 when there were no buildings at Site 23, and that they were digging the underground ducts for the cables from the antenna field to the planned operations bldg. He retired in 1960 as a Major.

EWING, Walter R LtCol Det 27, 56-58

TUSLOG Det 27 was organized on 01 October 1957. On 26 December 1957 Det 27's TD was 3 Officer's and 15 EM. Maj Cambell, CPT William E. Loving, CPT Ancil D. Adams and WO Alfred I Diehl were the first officer's assigned to Det 27. Maj Cambell got there shortly thereafter and was under the command of USASAEUR and Col. Peterson in Frankfurt, Germany. Morale on the whole was excellent and with the help of Maurice Cammack I've been able to reconstruct the names of 13 of the 15 EM as follows:

Sgt Woodard, The initial location of the detachment was in the JUSMMAT Hqs complex. On 01 February 1958, the detachment moved from the JUSMMAT complex to the new Hqs bldg located at 329A and 331A Ataturk Blvd across from the American Embassy. Det 4-1 was also located there. The mission of Det 27 at that time was to monitor the construction of Site 23, provide the initial authorization for the unit and perform such other activities as were assigned by USASAEUR.

The EM asgnd to Det 27 at that time were housed in the USAF billets in Ankara. However, approx 10% of the E4s and above without dependants lived on the Ankara

economy. Special services support, medical support and messing facilities were provided by the USAF Det 30 in the city of Ankara, Turkey. Of the two buildings that were occupied by Detachment 27 in its embryonic days, the building at 329A Ataturk Blvd contained the office of the CO, the Adjutant (CPT Adams) and the Admin section. The balance of the buildings were occupied by TUSLOG Det 14 (an element of the Army comm admin network-possibly Det 66 was formed from Det 14, but not sure). The building at 331A Ataturk Blvd contained the motor pool dispatcher's office, the fiscal office, the supply office, unit supply and a combined conference and training room. The motor pool performed 1st echelon maintenance on the assigned vehicles. All other maintenance was the responsibility of the TUMPANE company which was under contract to TUSLOG.

In 1969 Det 4-4 tried to organize a 8 man tackle football team with Larry Harris as the team coach and the QB, but there was not enough interest and Harris was recruited by one of the zoomie teams and they won the post championship. Det 4-4 in 1970 fielded a team, but Larry Harris had rotated and I was a member of that 8 man tackle football team that was played on a 40 X 80 field. I remember a play we called the "Lonesome Pole Cat". It was one I had seen in the early 60's. It is outlawed now. The process was that all the players on the sidelines would stand up next to the line. The receiver would stand just in front of them and act as if he was part of the group. Then once the ball was in play he would receive the ball and run like hell. That was the game where the (AF) quarterback (who had played some pro football) was shooting off his mouth about the 100 points. Dave Bugar (our linebacker) and I decided that we were going to put him out of the game. Each time in the huddle we renewed that vow. Finally in the third quarter

we high lowed him. Dave came in from the left, right between his knees and ankles and I came from the right and put a helmet in his rib cage. All I heard was this gush of air. He couldn't stand up or talk straight. He was asking for his mother or something like that when they took him away. That was a hell of a game and we had a great coach and the CO, Maj Frickey walked the sidelines encouraging us to do our best.

The Florida State Electric Auto Racing Association (FSEARA), the longest running radio control racing organization in the nation, celebrated in 2008 its 29th year of, sportsmanship, leadership and excellence. We wouldn't have made it this far without the support of all racers and their families and to those individuals like Rocky Hagan which we lost in March 2008 who had the vision of this state series (FSEARA) being something great today.

Rosie informs that Willie liked to pull practical jokes on others and then chuckle at the results. I contacted Warren Mulder in August 2005. He enlisted at Sioux Falls, SD for duty with the ASA, took his oath Jan. 28, 1960. Took basic at Fort Leonard Wood and then on to Devens for dits and dahs. Was sent to Bad Aibling in September 1960 and volunteered for a transfer to Det 27 in January 1961. Serving 2 yrs. 9 mo. and 1 day, getting out Oct. '62. He enjoyed trying to remember names of old ex-058 friends that he knew at Manzarali. Laughed when I ask him if he remembered Chicken Hawk. Said, of course - everyone knew Henry Coyle and that Chicken Hawk would bet on most anything including on what side of a post that a bird would "poop" or how far a camel could spit. The next day we were called to an information formation in dress uniform and informed that the President was dead and we were essentially restricted to base. There was a news blackout amongst us barracks rats, though the Families and Senior NCOs and Officers were getting the news. At the time we were more interested in what the Russians might do. Book Review: Voices Under Berlin - A Novel of the Berlin Spy Tunnel by T.H.E. Hill Written by Lou Novacheck

Voices Under Berlin was somewhat of a sleeper when it was first printed, but word is getting around now, which necessitated a second printing.

This is the story of the Berlin Tunnel and the people who listened in on the conversations and tapped into the teletype messages of both the East Germans and the

Soviets, who occupied East Germany from 1945 until 1989. Digging for Operation Gold, or Operation Stopwatch, as it was called by the British, began in September 1954 and was completed in February 1955. The tunnel was opened on February 25th, and lasted only 11 months, 11 days, before it was penetrated by the Soviets.

Although the operation was compromised while it was still in the planning stages by a British double agent, George Blake, the Soviet KGB decided to allow the project to go on, seeing it as a golden opportunity for disinformation. A warehouse with an especially deep tunnel was built specifically as a staging area for the tunnel. The 1,476-foot tunnel sat about 20 feet under the most heavily patrolled border in existence, and only 18-inches under a busy street. It was an engineering marvel.

It was impossible, of course, to alert all the East Germans and Soviets in the Occupied Zone of the tap, and the CIA eventually collected and recorded over a half-million calls, which were recorded onto some 50,000 magnetic tapes. It was only in 1961 that the U.S. learned of the KGB compromise, when Blake was arrested, tried, and convicted, but since the haul was full of valuable intelligence, it was deemed a success. The tapes were recorded and translated by hundreds of U.S. Army linguists on site in the Berlin Tunnel, as well as by those in CIA headquarters in the U.S. Although Voices Under Berlin is a novel, most of the operational data is real, with mainly the people and situations depicted being fiction.

In addition to the riveting story of the Tunnel and day-to-day revelations and discoveries, this is also the hilarious, and dramatic and emotional story of those who accomplished it - hilarious because of the sometimes intense boredom, and intensely dramatic and emotional due to the constant pressure of being susceptible to discovery and possible death at the hands of the Russians and East Germans. When one is under such severe and life-threatening pressure for weeks on end, it's no wonder that those involved resorted to the pranks and jokes they pulled, both on one another and on the Soviets and East Germans.

I strongly recommend Voices Under Berlin to anybody who's interested in the Cold War, or anybody who's ever been in the military. They'll immediately recognize many of the characters and situations. The jargon is very well explained, and it has a handy glossary to help you through the occasional "Pentagonese" that needs translating. And even if you have no particular interest in the Cold War or the military, most will still assuredly enjoy this book. Don't miss it!

Phil enlisted in August 1954 at Detroit, Michigan for ASA duty that included language school at Monterey. Took basic at Fort Leonard Wood, then sent to Fort Devens for processing and then sent to the DLI in Monterey for 6 months of training in the Russian language. Was assigned to the 307th ASA Battalion in Kassel, Germany and then in April 1956 was part of the ASAE levee to beef up the ASA in Turkey, especially at Sinop.

Phil Pavlic was part of this levee, which was made up of volunteers from the 307th and 302nd Comm/Recon battalions stationed at Kassel and Baumholder, Germany and some others from units in Germany. The following are the names that Phil remembers who were fortunate to go to Turkey:

Frank Amigo, the two Brinkman's, Leonard & _, Melvin Deatheridge, Gene Montagne, Fred Sauber, John Aldridge, Redding, John Samuels, Buddt Musick, Buck Goss and others whose names have faded from his memory.

After a short familiarization course, the volunteers were assembled at the 251st ASA Processing Co at Gutleut Kaserne in Frankfurt near the Hauptbahnhof train station and the nearby beer gardens, bars and discos.

They were there one day and then transported via bus to Rhein Main and boarded a DC3 and flew THROUGH, not over or around, the Alps to Ankara. After a short stay in Ankara in a rather nice hotel they were loaded on deuce-and-a-halves and driven for a eternity to Samsun, then Sinop. Arriving at twilight they de-trucked and heard the words of First Sergeant William E.Tyner, "Gentlemen,this is your home, now build it". Home

was on a barren hilltop. So they started to build it. Starting in pup tent and field conditions we starting to work.



The above photo was snapped by Buddy Musick in April 1956 and shows the hardship that the first batch of ASA soldiers coped with until the Jamesway huts were erected. The post mascot dog, GIMP, can be seen on the left behind a 2-seater outhouse. Gimp was for many years revered by all who served on the hill, except the Turks.

I will tell a long story of the development of the post called Det 4. If there is interest, perhaps later. To my recollection the OIC was 1LT Walt Garrett, but now am informed that the first OIC was a 1LT named Pat Rose who departed shortly after I arrived. An older captain named Ken Allison was there but don't remember his title. Maybe he was the XO. Maj Jim Green was the commander who

was commanding from Samsun, but soon moved the headquarters to Sinop. LT Garrett became the Operations officer. Other officers were Lt Bill Stuckert, Lt Jim Mulholland, Lt Ray Keane, Lt Hal Fleming and WO Arnold Taylor. Somewhere, I have a Letter of Commendation signed by LT Walter Garrett and endorsed by MAJ Green. I mention this only because the letterhead includes a designation of an ASA company, 256th or something like that. I will look for it so I can be more exact. I remember the jets with red stars flying over the post several times while I was on the hill. Others that Phil remembers are: 2 brothers who worked in the motor pool; Sgt Franklin & SP3 Counts who were medics, a character named Frenchy Lafatain (Sp?)

Phil extended his stay at Sinop by 3 months in order to get an early out. Left Det 4 in May 1957 in a taxi with 3 others for the trip to Ankara. From Ankara flew to Athens where he layed over for 7 or 8 days before catching a flight stateside. Was discharged at Fort Sheridan in Illinois where he submitted the receipts for the taxi ride from Sinop and the hotel bills in Ankara and Athens. Got married to Elsteth in 1957 and graduated
