NEXT TO NEARPASS AND SITTING ON CAMELS BACK IS RUBIN KIDD FROM LYNCHBURG VIRGINIA. HE WAS MY ROOMMATE FOR THE LAST 6 MONTHS AT DET 27. HE ALSO MOONLIGHTED AT THE NCO CLUB. TO THE FAR RIGHT IS CALVIN LAM FROM ELKTON, VIRGINIA. NOT KNOWING UNTIL WE MEET UP IN THE MILITARY WE BOTH WORKED AT THE SAME FACTORY IN VIRGINIA AND WERE UNAWARE OF EACH OTHER.

I HAVE LOST CONTACT WITH BOTH BUT WILL NEVER LOSE THE MEMORIES!!

My entire time at Çerkezhöyük I wished I was home, once I did get back home I realized it wasn't all that bad---what an experience!!! I remember the first words said to me when we got off the bus in front of the barracks, and it was not welcome, "do you play football?" So I spent most of my 15 months playing on just about any sports team that would have me. In my first few days I met up with Trent Douglas and later on Bill McDonaldson and Tony Moulton. We made the Kennedy family rich by trying to consume all the Scotch that could be imported. I do remember the Saturday mornings at the NCO Club (sick call), steak and eggs for a \$1 and dime beer till noon. A troop could get wasted for \$2, where can you do that now? A couple of times we went straight from the club to the Mess Hall for lunch, now that was not pretty. Sgt. Hamilton of Op's Company "requested" we not go anymore after Trent Douglas fell off the front porch into the lattice work and destroyed the roses, not to mention his shirt. Lucky the medics were in our barracks and patched him up.



Till making Desk Sgt., I spent many cold nights at the above Manzarali front gate watching returning troops return from town (wasted) and trading cigarettes with the Turkish guards walking our perimeter.

Sometimes I ran out of money and even had to smoke those god awful things. The day I left for the USA and my discharge was a sad day, before getting on the bus early in the morning we set off the fire alarm in the barrack for a "wake up call" and laughed all the way to the airport--

--then it hit me, I was already missing my friends. I have lost contact with everyone with exception of Douglas and after 27 years of just Xmas cards, in 1993, Trent came to visit me while I was working in Singapore. Hopefully one day I will see others who made my life bearable while in Turkey.

Minister's Book Provides Tribute To His Son
Jesse Strong Died For His Country

ALBANY -- In the summer of 2004, a young seminary student asked his pastor father for his thoughts on things big and small, from the purpose of life and deep theological discussions to parenting tips.

Jesse Strong, 23, wanted his father, the Rev. Nathan Strong of Albany, to put those thoughts in writing. Jesse wanted to have his father write a book, something to have when he could not talk to his father about theology.

Rev. Strong, Albany Methodist Church pastor, said he did not have any sense of urgency. A year later, U.S. Marine Jesse Strong died in Iraq.

Then Rev. Strong began the five-year effort of writing "Thoughts for Jesse: A Father's Tribute," now complete.

He wrote as if he was talking to Jesse. "Sometimes it felt like he was talking to me," Strong said Friday.

It was not easy. At first, "it helped me through the initial stages of grief to being to write for him," Strong writes in the introduction.

Then he went back to another project. When that was done, he found the momentum to write a book for Jesse had faltered.

"I couldn't see what the point was, if he was never going to get to read it. He was the only reason I had even begun it."

But people whose lives Jesse had touched kept asking for the book and for advice. One young mother, impressed with Jesse's passion for finding joy in life

and sharing his faith, asked if Strong had any parenting advice.

"I told her she would have to wait for the book," he said, "as that was one of the questions Jesse wanted me to address."

It rekindled his desire to write the book, but not as a theological discussion, although Biblical references abound as footnotes. The book is now written as a father would share thoughts with a son.

Jesse did not intend to be a minister but wanted to share his faith and seek a better way in everything he did, in school, play and in the service. He attended Southern Evangelical Theological Seminary in South Carolina, not because he wanted to be a minister but because he wanted to learn more about theology.

He wanted to talk with others, like school founder Norman Geisler, known internationally as a Christian thinker, Strong said. And he found inspiration in everything, from bowling to the service.

Jesse's favorite expression - "making a good adjustment" - came from bowling, but reflected his goal to making improvements in sports and in life.

"I wrote it to give him a voice in what he was interested in and would have been doing, if he had lived," Strong said.

It is a book anyone would enjoy, he said. "I didn't realize until after I was done that it's also a good resource for a young person thinking about life ahead."

His other son, Matthew, was one of the first to read the book. He said, "Leave it to Jesse to know all that stuff was in Dad and was the one to pull it out."

Strong gave himself an hour a day to write it, finding his best inspiration at 11 a.m. each day - not coincidentally the same time that he gives his sermons in church.

An aspiring author, Strong was his own editor and proofreader. His wife, Vicki, listened to him read each day's new passages - and believed she knew the book by heart before it was ever printed.

The book, available for \$9.99 on Amazon, is self-published. The cover features a photograph of the Tetons Mountains by Jesse's sister Heather. It includes as a preface the eulogy Heather and Matthew gave at the memorial service on Feb. 4, 2005 at Lake Region Union High School, which was attended by the Rev. Jerry Falwell.

It has photographs of Jesse at home, at school and in the service. And it includes the hand-written list of "Dad's Random Theological Topics" Jesse gave his dad in hopes he would answer the questions in the book.

As he says in the book's introduction: "Jesse always stimulated me to do more, to do better, and he still has that effect on me. That's really the reason for this book. I hope it has a little of that effect on you."

In thinking back on writing the book, Strong reflected a moment on Friday about his book and Jesse.

"For it me, it was kind of a cool way to carry on what he was doing," he said. "It is a summary of my life's work. I never would have done it without him."




Chuck is retired from GM, is, like me, born in 1936, retired, but still tinkering in construction work in his spare time.




