Walter R. Las, Age 71, passed away on Friday, March 11, 2011, at his home. Interment is in East Ridgelawn Cemetery, Clifton, N.J. Walter was born and raised in Passaic, N.J., before moving to Parsippany, N.J., 32 years ago. He served in the United States Army from Nov. 21, 1961, until being honorably discharged on Aug. 24, 1964. Walter was a member of the United States Army Security Agency (ASA) which from 1945 through 1976 was the United States Army's signal intelligence branch. Its motto was "Vigilant Always." He was the sales manager at Benedict-Miller, where he worked for over 50 years. Survivors include his wife, Theresa (nee Wierzbicki); his sons, Walter A. Las and Andrew Sadowski and his wife, Lisa; his daughters, Laura J. Strunck, Lucy E. Ricker and Maureen E. Hornecker and her husband, Richard; his mother, Helen (nee Burgess) Las; his sister and brother-in-law, Laraine and William Brower, and his grandchildren, Matthew, Stephen, Kara, Christopher, Lucas, and Anya.

On 13 March 2011 I received the following up-date from Maureen: [edited] Thank you so much for sending the death notice to those who knew my father from the ASA reunions. I cannot express to you how much ASA meant to my father. He passed away with his wife, daughter & son-in-law, step-son & daughter-in-law and step-daughter around his bedside. His son and daughter are in Texas & Illinois (there are 5 of us total). Thank you for sending out the call for pictures. I have already seen responses and I could not be more grateful.

VANDEVER, JR., JOHN JOSEPH "JACK", 70, a resident of Pasadena, MD, died on 7 February 2011 after a six year battle with esophageal cancer. He was born on 20 August 1940, to Helen and John Vandever of Haddon Heights, NJ.

Jack graduated from Haddon Heights High School in 1958 and went on to Gettysburg College, PA, where he majored in English and graduated in 1962. Jack was active in Sigma Chi fraternity beginning while he was at Gettysburg. He also met his wife, Judith Curchin Vandever there; they married after graduation in 1962. In 1979, he received his Master of Arts in Management and Supervision from Central Michigan University.

After receiving his US Army commission in the fall of 1962, he remained on active duty for 20 years. He had various assignments during those years - some of the more memorable are an assignment to Arlington Hall Station, VA, in 1962-63, where their daughter, Lesley, was born, and where they saw President Kennedy lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier shortly before he was assassinated; a 3 year stint in Fairbanks, Alaska, where their son, Jay, was born; a tour in the Republic of Viet Nam where Jack served as a senior intelligence advisor; three years at Fort Knox, KY, where the family bought their first boat and enjoyed camping and fishing at the "Land

between The Lakes"; **an unaccompanied year in Sinop, Turkey**; another three years with the family in Stuttgart, Germany; and finally to Fort Meade, MD where he retired in 1982 from the US Army Intelligence and Security Command. Jack then went back to work for the US Air Force and spent another 13 years there as a civilian employee before retiring again.

Jack's interests were many. He was an Eagle Scout, and a member of the Order of the Arrow. He attended the the Ranch in NM. He served on the Supervisory Committee for Tower Federal Credit Union from June 1999 until May 2006, and was Chairman from 2002 to 2006. He was on the Gettysburg College Alumni Board from 1996 - 2006, and he was active in the Northern Anne Arundel County Chapter of the Coastal Conservation Association where he served as treasurer from 2002-2006. He enjoyed boating, fishing, camping, reading and travel.

Survivors include his wife of 48 years, Judy; daughter Lesley and her partner, Jennifer Wilson; son Jay and his wife, Valerie, and three grandchildren, Shannon, Tarah and Jonathan. In addition he leaves a brother, Jim and his wife Judy; a sister, Jane MacKenzie and her husband Kenneth, and a sister-in-law, Pat Curchin. Jack was predeceased by a brother, Richard C. Vandever, who died in 1980.

Jack's ashes will be incorporated into a reef ball which will become part of The Eternal Reefs restoration project in the Chesapeake Bay.

LARSON, Lawrence N., (Larry), YOB 29DE1935, RA17531385, 058/059, E3-E4, Det 4, MY59-MY60, (RoDean- dec), 3316 Woodland St., Ames, IA 50014, 515-292-3306, On 12 March 2011 I received a call from Larry Larson who wanted to know if I was the one to contact regarding his time at a place called Sinop and Det 4. I replied yes and then proceeded to ask questions about his tour at Det 4.

During the course of our chat I learned that Larry had graduated from Iowa State University in Ames IA in 1958 and had lost his draft defernment. He debated whether to take his chances at not being drafted or joining up. He opted for enlistment and selected ASA as his choice and was inducted on 8 September 1958. Took BCT at Fort Collins at Colorado Springs, CO. He had expected to be sent to Monterey, CA for training in the Russian Language. But that was not possible as there were no slots available and he was sent to Fort Devens, MA where he learned that he would be trained as a dit – dot intercept operator. He did not mind and successfully completed the morse code training and was awarded the MOS of 058. It is interesting to note that he was first in his class and had the choice of assignments to either Korea or Turkey and he chose Turkey and never regretted it.

He was the only one from his class to be assigned to Det 4. He flew from Ankara to Sinop on the L-19 aircraft.

Small-town grocery Larry Larson makes big impact in Slater



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Town and Country Market, a small grocery store in Slater owned by Ames resident Larry Larson, sometimes records more than 800 sales a day.

SLATER — Larry Larson took a break from cutting meat behind the display case in the Town and Country Market butcher shop.

An oldies radio station played selections by Chicago ("Twenty-Five or Six to Four") and Three Dog Night ("Celebrity Ball").

Up at the front checkout, Heather Beaird waited on customers.

"I was here at 5 a.m., unloading a truck," Larson said.

"It was a short night, so I went home for a nap so I could come back in the afternoon to work."

The small-town grocer has done his share of work over the past 30-plus years. He's owned and operated the thriving store since the mid 1970s. Town and Country Market records about 300 cash register transactions each day, he said.

"Just before big snowstorms, we sometimes get up to 800 (transactions)," Larson said.



"It's getting busier with school about to start. There's been a lull since the Fourth of July, but it's picking up."

An Ames resident, Larson and his wife, RoDean, live on Woodland Avenue, and are the parents of two grown children.

Politics is part of Larson's resume, too. He served three terms on the Story County Board of Supervisors, the first from 1977-80, and the next two from 1989 to 1996.

"I left the courthouse for the last time in 1996," he said, showing an Ames Tribune story written by Marty Helle.

"When I left, I'd been connected with politics in some way for 25 years, and I see that I had hair back then," said Larson

The Board of Supervisors wasn't Larson's only experience with politics. As a Democratic state representative, Larson represented part of Ames, a large portion of southern Story County and part of Jasper County in the General Assembly.

"And I had the store the whole time," he said.

Larson's career in the grocery business began four years after his father, who ran the West Street Grocery in Ames, died in 1957.

In 1961, Larson, fresh out of the U.S. Army Security Agency, went to work in the store and ran it until it closed in 1972 – "although I did take two years off to go to graduate school (where he majored in political science)," he said.

It seemed that politics and groceries were still in Larson's blood, because after the Ames store closed, he bought the one in Slater (from former owners Ed and Doris Hulme) in 1976, and has been running it ever since.

"Ed Rood ran a newspaper in the building next door for quite some time," Larson said.

The paper is gone, but the grocery store survives. In fact, Larson got a building permit this year for a new, 20-foot-by-40-foot stock room, where he plans to have a warehouse and a place to store his forklift.

Town and Country Market's main floor covers about 24,000 square feet, including dry goods, produce, non-perishables and the butcher area, stocked with fresh meats, cold cuts and bulk cheese.

On the front wall of the store, Larson planted Boston ivy, which grows thickly up the wall and around the display windows. He has also built up a thriving garden business in an open space just to the east.

"We do a lot with plants in the spring," he said.

And even in August, there's a large selection of shrubs and annuals.

Steady customers come mainly from Slater, although there are regulars from Madrid, Huxley and Cambridge, too, Beard said.

"The job is easy to do, and I get along with everyone," she said.

Over the years, Town & Country Market has acquired its own personality, Larson said.

"We don't sell alcohol or tobacco, but we do sell lots of food," he said.
"A big shipment of Halloween candy just came in, and I'll be working on that later today."

The store may be getting some extra help. Mounted over a calendar in the back room is a small statue of St. Adrian.

"He is the patron saint of butchers, arms dealers and prison guards," Larson said.

A neighborhood grocery store would often unify the neighborhood because nearly everyone living in the area eventually passed through its doors. A Chicago woman called the store once, asking if anyone there had seen her son. He was unknown to the Larsons, but they posted a sign on the cash register as she requested, telling the missing young man to “call home.” Larry reports that over the years there were several burglaries.

In 1976, Larry purchased a store in Slater and has owned and operated Slater Town & Country Market ever since. (2011)
