Dear Elder, Many thanks for sending "The Det 4 Early Birds" to me and I will appreciate your continuing to do so. Phil Hotton's description of life in Sinop is essentially correct and I can think of little to add to it. As he mentions, I was the OIC of the Sinop bunch in 1955-56 and a memorable experience it was. I would mention that it is my opinion that the work we did in 55-56 was the stimulus which caused the rapid increase in the size of the ASA presence at Sinop.

It was not my intention to be in ASA. It was an accident, I guess one could say. I was in

the Signal Corps, a 1st Lt., fairly proficient in communications/electronics, and was assigned to Turkey, as a SigC "Radar Officer". I didn't know a damn thing about radar, but after getting to Ankara in April 1955 and hanging around there for what seemed like ages, I finally got sent to Samsun, and then Sinop as the OIC of that detachment. I replaced another Lieutenant who departed shortly after my arrival. His first name was Bobby and I've forgotten his surname. Until I got there I had absolutely no idea of what we were doing up on the Black Sea. I remember that there were about a dozen GI's and we had leased the Sinop Palas Hotel for our quarters, plus I believe there was another house that some of the men leased for their quarters. It didn't take long to find out what the job was.....entirely ELINT at that time, and it was a blast. Toward the end of my tour in late 1955 or early 1956 we unpacked some airborne X-band receiving equipment and succeeded in making some of what I believe were the first intercepts and recordings of Soviet airborne conical scan signals in X-band. That, I believe, was the reason for the subsequent intense and rapid escalation of the Sinop site. Sometime during my tour in Sinop, ASA took over the mission from the Signal Corps. I later moved to Germany with ASA and later to the 316th ASA battalion at Camp Wolters, Texas. Following that assignment, I went back to more typical Signal Corps assignments, but the "electronic warfare" experience stuck to me, and I had several assignments in that field. After Vietnam, where I commanded a Corps Signal Battalion, a tour at the Pentagon and later my final tour in London, I retired as a Colonel in 1976. You will have to forgive me because I am a University of Texas "T-sipper", which is a big problem here in Junction with its strong Aggie following - still, they do tolerate me. I'm 81 and own a 7300 acre cattle ranch and it keeps me busy. I have a son who lives in Dallas, and we visit now and then. Maybe I will have the chance to visit with you and the other ASA'ers sometime. Best wishes, Pat Rose

Also in the casino is 86 table games, a night club and a 1000-seat riverside amphitheater, live music performances. Free parking and multiple promotions and giveaways daily. I definitely recommend checking it out. It offers an interesting alternative activity for something to do on a Tuesday morning. All casino's allow smoking in the gambling area, but wasn't bad and we went home without cigarette odor on our clothes.

Tuesday evening – 9 October - - - We had intended to have a plated meal at the LeMont Restaurant on Mount Washington, but the price was too steep and we had to cancel. BUT, no visit to Pittsburgh is complete without a stop atop Mt. Washington to view the amazing view of Pittsburgh especially at night. USA Today Weekend Magazine calls it the “second most beautiful view in America.

To get to Mt. Washington we will ride up/down on the Duquesne incline which is a beautifully restored cable car used by commuters since 1877. From the parking lot you will have to walk up a lot of steep stairs to get to the station. There is no charge for senior citizens to ride the incline, but the capacity is 23 people per trip. You can drive to Mount Washington if need be. The times for the outing to Mt Washington will be posted in the hospitality room and a PIZZA style meal will be catered to the hospitality room at 6:30 pm. The price will be \$20. per person.



Green Hornet,

Wow! You got him. The only thing missing is my blood type. 'Don't remember the plane crash but I watched the whole mess at the gate develop from the top of a trash can outside our barracks, which overlooked the front gate. It was also the day I cleared post while thermite's were placed on consoles and M-2s' were pulled from crates marked "ice cream making machine". Nothing, but NOTHING, was going to delay my departure from that s..t-hole. I was flown out late that afternoon to Ankara and then went on to Bad Aibling. Nineteen years after ETS I enlisted in the Illinois National Guard and retired with 20 years combined service as an E-8. My telephone is: 847-854-9614. There is a machine (we screen all calls) so identify yourself and if we are really home one of us will pick-up; if no p/u just leave a message and I'll get back ASAP. I have to tell you, G.H., that I am totally stunned by this. Amazing.

I read #234 and the posting by Don Cairns re the "first" sail boat owned by a G.I. at Det. #4 in 1960. The above photo shows yours-truly at the tiller with a big smile. The boat was about 15' long, wood plank with oakum stuffed seams, small jib, lateen/sloop main, and a sheet-metal drop-keel. Additionally, all of the running and standing rigging was old fashioned hemp rope. Hell, you could just shred some and smoke it There was only one around in '60 so it's possible Don just forgot my name like I forgot his (easy thing to do) as being part of the group that built it. ((Cairns wrote in DOOL# 110 that in early 1960 Don Lewis & him (w/the help of the Turks built the 1st sail boat to be owned & op by the GIs. Called the Beverly Jeanne

Biography of: Stanton (Stan) Faitz
TUSLOG Det. #4, May, 1960 – May, 1961, Sinop

I was born July 12, 1939 in Chicago, Illinois. We moved to Evergreen Park, Il. in late 1939. My father was in the Illinois Army National Guard and was mobilized in May, 1941. He was a 0-2 (cannon-cocker) and able to take his family to his CONUS assignments. That started the moving-van discount program. After the War we ended up back in Evergreen Park, I attended various schools, and graduated from H.S. in Orland Park, Illinois in 1957. I then attended Illinois Wesleyan University (“attended” translates to “..drank my way out the front door”) and eventually was found standing, dazed, in an Army recruiting office in Chicago enlisting in the ASA.

Basic was taken at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri, aka “Fort Lost in the Woods, Misery” (at night special teams would turn all the rocks over so the sharp edges always pointed up). Then, on to Fort Devens, Mass. and 058 school.

One of my class-mates was PFC Brian R. Campbell; he played a “mean” guitar. He also wrote the following song:

When trouble starts we are never there,
You can find us in the “Wig-Wam” in Ayer,
Swilling cans of Black Label, chasing Doris ‘round the table,
We are members of the mighty ASA!
ASA! ASA! We are members of the mighty ASA!
We are filled with esprit de corps, we couldn’t stomach any more,
We are members of the mighty ASA ,
Cha, Cha, Cha, Ump, Suck!

After the glorious days of Doris and Boston, I shipped to Det#4, arriving on or about 18 May 1960. Upon arrival I pulled the usual interior guard duty, then was assigned to my “trick”. To kill the off-duty time a small group of us bought a sail boat (see dool #234) although there are memory issues as to names. I also became a part-time disc-jockey at the local Armed Forces Radio station “KYSO” which was a very low watt transmitter that could only be caught on the Hill, although a “skip” might get it picked up elsewhere (this call-sign preceded the hard-wired station “KBOK” mentioned in several editions of dool). Our identifying announcement was:

“You’re listening to radio station “KYSO”; The musical voice of Diogenes station!”

I remember Alpha Dog “Gimp” and his untimely death under the wheels of a Deuce; I remember helping a tiny dog named “Shorty” (or maybe “Stubby”?) find carnal bliss with a lady dog much, much taller than he. And of course, let’s not forget the riot at the main gate (and on post) May 17, 1961, which was also the day I cleared post. I watched some of the action while standing on a trash can behind our barrack (it overlooked the gate). Turkish soldiers and workers were giving the G.I.s’ on gate-duty a difficult time until a Turkish officer got them into a formation and started to pistol-whip them in the face to bring about some form of military discipline. It’s been said that that officer was Turkish Navy but he was dressed in the same brown wool as his troops. In any case, a G.I. that ventured outside that day was faced with a possible beating by irate Turkish workers building the new post.

It was also the day I cleared post while thermite's were placed on consoles and M-2s' were pulled from crates marked "ice cream making machine". Nothing, but NOTHING, was going to delay my departure from that shit-hole.

I, on the other hand, never had a problem walking around to get departmental sign-off. I watched classified papers burned, thermite grenades sitting on consoles, and M-2 machine-guns pulled from crates in supply marked "ice cream machine" (to mount on the gun-rings atop truck cabs). Rumor-control said that if we stood all staff upright in the backs of available Deuces' everyone could get out. However, as every Turk had a shotgun the guys on the outside would have caught hell. Later that day I was flown out to Ankara in a L-19 en-route to Bad Aibling, Germany.

A side-bar to my Sinop narrative is that in 2010 I was at a working cattle ranch in Wyoming and ran into a guest named "Ari" who was an Israeli, ex-IDF guy (and possible Mossad-type). Somehow we got onto the subject of Turkey and I mentioned serving at Sinop. He paused, looked at me and said: "you were in Special Communications! You're CIA!". Once that comment was made no amount of denial could convince anyone otherwise.

At Bad Aibling, aside from being just another 058.10, I was a charter member of the 320th Sport Parachute Club sponsored by 10th Special Forces Group at Bad Tolz. In Sept/Oct 1961 six of us were seconded to the 10th for a field problem called "Devil Spread (?) II. After that I requested, and received, an overseas separation, walking out the gate August 31, 1962 headed to the Middle East. The passport reads Egypt and everything along the beach, finally heading back to Europe via Haifa. With an overseas separation - the Army was responsible for movement to CONUS for one year. I walked into the Transportation officers room with \$100 in my pocket, long hair, beard, torn jeans, sandals' and smelling like a goat. The man had a very colorful vocabulary. Anyway, after getting a shave, shower and buying a suit, shirt and tie at the PX, I arrived at McGuire AFB, New Jersey with \$10 left. The only way home was by thumb, which took only three rides to get within ½ mile of my parents house in Orland Park, Illinois. Not bad.

Once back in the States, I got into the import/export business, spending 50% of my time traveling, either domestically or internationally. This meant working for American, Japanese, English and German firms until retirement from the industry.

After the Soviets invaded Afgan-land, the Illinois Army National Guard allowed me to do a one year trial-enlistment Feb. 16, 1982 (age 42 with a 19.5 year break in service) as an E-4, 11B40 rifleman. In late 1989 I took-over a HHC as an E-7 "acting" 1SG, then on 30 Apr 1991 was promoted to E-8 1SG. This was followed by Army retirement January 2, 2000 with just over 20 years of combined service.

Now, my wife, Janet, and I are both retired and travel during the summer in a 5th wheel trailer, or we baby-sit the grand-kids, and generally grow old. Life is good!

TURKS DEMAND U. S. GIVE UP 4 GIs IN SLAYING

Probe Native Sentry's Death in Brawl

ANKARA, Turkey, May 31—The Turkish army has asked the United States to turn over four American soldiers stationed here to be tried on charges of killing a Turkish sentry or as accessories to the sentry's death.

According to the Turkish version, Pvt. Rifat Aslan was shot dead by American Pfc. Bruce L. Mondahl during a free-for-all between Turkish and American soldiers. Another Turk was seriously injured, the Turks report.

The incident occurred early May 17 at Sinop on the Black sea, east of Zonguldak, where Americans are building a radar station.

Struggle for Gun

According to the American version, a Turkish soldier, Yakup Arduc, seized a carbine from American Pvt. Edward Wood in the free-for-all and began to fire wildly. Aslan attempted to recover the weapon and in the ensuing struggle the carbine went off and Aslan was killed.

Besides Mondahl, the Americans sought by the Turks are Pfc. Thomas D. Churchill, who came upon the scene of the

GOLDFINE ASKS TO WITHDRAW HIS PLEA OF GUILTY

Boston, May 31 (AP)—Bernard Goldfine, a millionaire industrialist today filed a motion in federal court seeking to withdraw his guilty plea on charge he evaded \$790,000 in income taxes. Goldfine is scheduled to be sentenced Monday.

Thru his counsel, Goldfine asked the court in today's motion for a sanity hearing to determine his competence to stand trial. The lawyer, Burton L. Williams, said that although a report of a court appointed psychiatrist said Goldfine was competent to enter a plea of guilty, the report did not state he was competent to stand trial.

Williams also said a report of the psychiatrist, Dr. Frank Straccia, did not warrant a finding that Goldfine is mentally competent, and should have called for a hearing to determine his mental competence. Federal Judge George C. Sweeney agreed to hear the motion a half-hour before he was set to pass sentence on the guilty plea Monday.



IT IS SINOP BARBER SHOP THAT MANY GI's FROM Det 4 FREQUENTED DURING THEIR TOUR ON THE HILL. IN 1966 2LT RICK ASPER WAS SENT BY ARLINGTON HALL TO DET 4 TO BE THE ASST S-2 AND HIS FIRST JOB WAS TO INVESTIGATE WHETHER THE BARBER IN SINOP WAS A KGB AGENT.


My question is" "What caused the S-2 at Arlington Hall to all of a sudden be concerned about this barber in Sinop?"

THIS BARBER ALSO WAS THE POST BARBER THAT CARLOS HUNT ENCOUNTERED IN 1958 DURING HIS FIRST VISIT TO THE POST BARBER SHOP FOR A HAIRCUT AND SHAVE. WHILE THE BARBER WAS SHAVING – CARLOS OBSERVED THE BARBER WIPING THE STRAIGHT EDGE RAZOR WITH A YELLOW SHEET OF PAPER AND THEREON WAS STAMPED TOP SECRET UMBRA. CARLOS IMMEDIATELY WENT TO OPERATIONS AND REPORTED THIS BREACH OF SECURITY TO THE OPS OFFICER, CAPT BURT SLESSINGER AND THAT WAS THE LAST THAT HE HEARD OF THIS INCIDENT.

ALSO IN 1958 AT DET 4 - A SGT JACK DUNLAP BEGAN SPYING FOR THE SOVIET UNION AND HIS ASSOCIATION WITH THIS BARBER IS NOT KNOWN.

To make a long story short – this Dunlap was recruited by the KGB while stationed at Sinop. How he was recruited is not known, but the construction foreman in 1958 at Det 4 was a blond haired Hungarian who later was found out to be a spy. After Det 4 Dunlap was assigned to NSA where he became a BIG TIME SPY for the Soviet Union until caught in 1963.





Its been 51 years since Bruce Mondahl was picked out of a line-up by four Turk by-standers as the one who shot PVT Rifat Aslan, the Turk guard who was shot at the Main gate to Det 4 on 17 May 1961.

The details of why and where this line-up took place and who else was in it is yet to be found out, but regardless it was a emotional time for Bruce Mondahl.

Aslan later died and Bruce Mondahl found himself in a no-win situation and had to prove that he was innocent of those charges. The fact was that Bruce Mondahl was on guard duty on the 17th and was nearby washing a jeep that he had used while patrolling the post when the shooting took place. Later Mondahl and several other GI's were exonerated by the Turks at a hearing in Samsun. All of those who were involved, except Eddie Wood, were transferred to Det 27 where they worked as 058's. Bruce Mondahl was also transferred to Det 27, but for the most part was kept in the Operations building until he was sent to Germany on onward to the States. I haven't had time to talk to Bruce Mondahl but his episode reminds me of the Amazing Grace Lyrics – lost but now am found.

I had all but given up hope of ever finding Bruce Mondahl and I must admit the embarrassing fact that all, including me had mis-spelled his last name and thought that it had to be Mondale. More later



When I stepped from the Boeing 707 in Ankara, the strong smell of Turkish cigarettes hit my nose and remained with me until the day I left the country. I remember in Ankara the broad boulevards, Ataturk's Tomb, the Byzantine walls, and the Citadel. The country around Manzarali Station was bleak with rolling dirt plains, poor wheat, mud brick villages, and sheep marked with bright daubs of paint.. I encountered my first honeydew melon at the Det 27 mess hall. As a country boy, I couldn't imagine a melon with green insides being any good!. It was delicious! That summer as I daily walked up to Ops, I greatly enjoyed seeing the periodic painting and repainting of the "fock rock". The first high level skills I learned at Det. 27 were to efficiently remove the carbons from the multipart paper created by the Ditty Bops and to transfer the DD173s to punched tape to be transmitted. Clay Lifto had already become a folk hero because of his blazing speed at doing that! He was my hero!

In Oct 1967, they transferred us down to Karamursel where we became Det. 4-4. We were assigned to Bldg 513 by the front gate. That location was probably to help us Army guys make a quick escape from the airbase in case things didn't work out! Our 1SG Rodkey decided he needed to make us into a disciplined Army unit so he had us stand formation and marched us around the base. We were a motley crew, and the

hangovers from late nights at the airmen's club didn't help! The good sergeant finally gave it up as a lost cause!

We were sure the Air Force guys were hanging out their windows laughing at us. But what would they know since they were "a paramilitary organization" aka the "Air Farce".

At Karamursel, I helped move a large rock into the hallway. We painted it green with white letters and so it became "Fock II" in memory of the famous Det. 27 "fock rock".

And so we had a rock for a unit mascot!

My best buddies at Det. 4-4 were Mike (Hazel) Hazelbaker, and Ralph (Eternal Weed) Tilney. Hazel gave me the nickname "Luna Tuna" because I persisted in "swimming" through the mailroom even when there was little hope of getting mail. Ray "Ozzie" Osborne and I did

a ten day trip to Israel in June 1968 exactly one year after the Six-Day War of 1967.

There was still a lot of war damage and many military checkpoints. At about the same time, Ralph and Mike did a trip down to Antalya and Side. When they got back, Ralph had given Mike the nickname "CrustySmellbad". Must have been some issues with Mike's personal hygiene on the trip! Other guys I remember very well from Det. 4-4 were Doug Lake, Jim Glick, Gary Dunnam, Ken Pollock, David Cifuni, Louis Belanos, Fat Hap, Gross Lund and J. R. Bean. I also remember well Lt. Holland and Maj. Cima.

We had a favorite cafe in Yalova where we would eat grilled lamb kebab, a green salad, Turkish french fries, with a glass of Kavaklidere wine, followed with some of that gummy, rich goats milk ice-cream. I never learned to like the muddy Turkish coffee, the bitter licorice tasting Yeni Raki or the hepatitis rings (sesame seed pretzels).

The scenic trips on the ferry to Istanbul were special. It started with a crusty grilled cheese sandwich at the dock. I liked to sit on the upper deck drinking chi and enjoying the scenery. Once during a stormy passage, I had to go below and got to watch seasick Turkish women throwing up into clear plastic bags!

Operations life at Det. 4-4 was mostly routine but the August 1968 invasion of Czechoslovakia by the Warsaw Pact created a lot of excitement for us SIGINT guys.

As you know, in 1968 I was a young E4-E5 assigned to Det. 4-4 at Karamursel Air Station, Turkey. One day I was strolling across the base lost in thought and didn't notice an Air Force captain passing by. He turned around, stopped me and severely chewed my butt for not saluting him. Fast forward some years. I am a GS-12 financial type working for the III Corps and Fort Hood Comptroller and attending an executive development course at Colorado Springs. To my surprise, the instructor teaching my ethics class was none other than the former Air Force captain who was now an LTC and

teaching at the Air Force Academy. Life has some interesting twists.


