THE 2002 REPORT IS IN DOOL #88 AND I'M STILL AMAZED THAT I WAS USING A SLOW DIAL-UP SERVER (ercgreen@yourinter.net) TO PREPARE THE DOOL'S. I TOOK MANY PHOTO'S ON 10 FLOPPY DISKS, BUT COULD NOT INCLUDE THEM IN #88, BUT NOW HAVE INCLUDED THEM HEREIN - I DID RECEIVE A EXCELLENT SLIDE SHOW CD FROM JIM HARBER, BUT WAS NOT ABLE TO COPY ANY OF THE PHOTO FROM THE SLIDE SHOW CD.

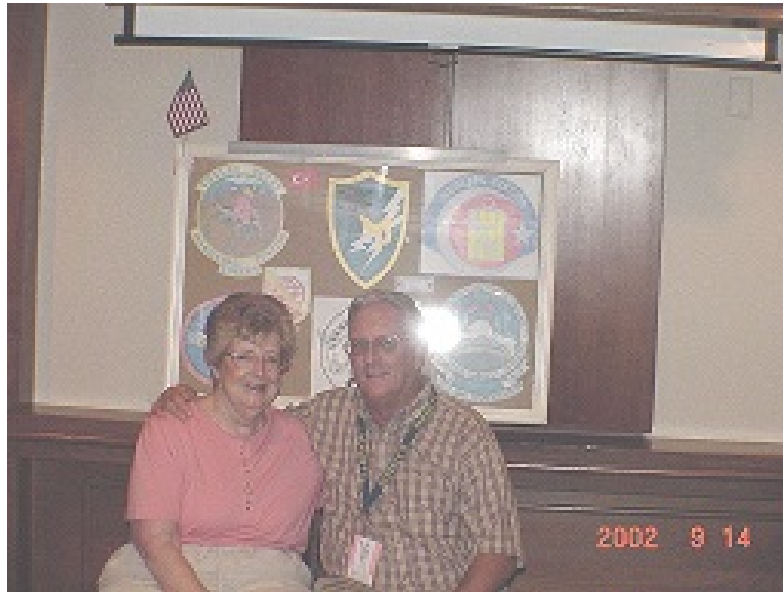

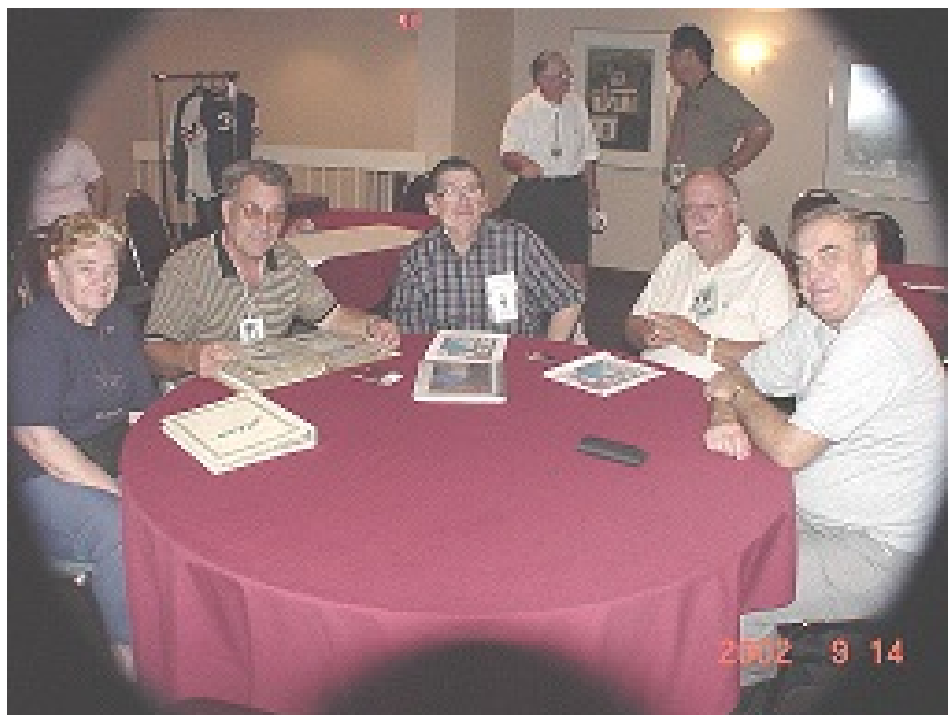

2. I recommend cities such as San Diego, Las Vegas, San Antonio, someplace in the mountains of Colorado, Wyoming, Washington DC, someplace in Florida - Miami, Tampa, Orlando?

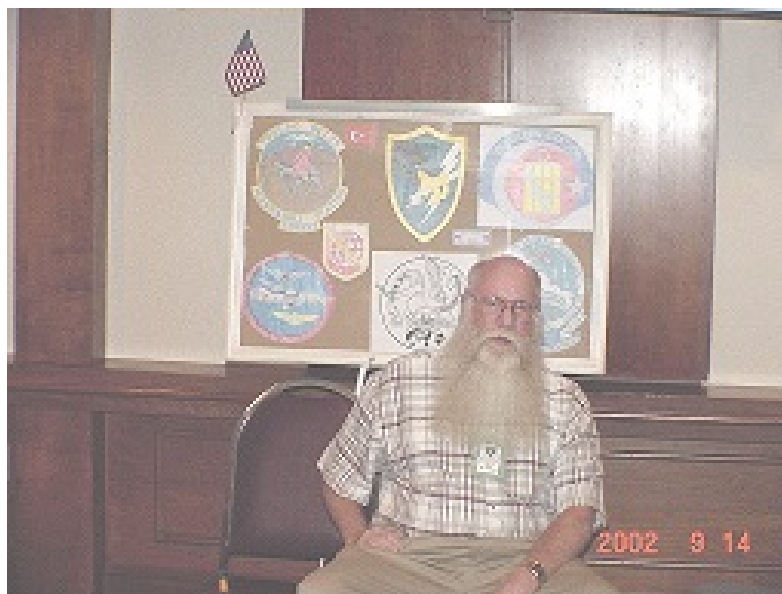

His family will always remember Robert “Bob” Eugene Holder, who had celebrated life for 87 years, 5 months and 6 days, before he was taken away by the scourge of lung cancer on 21 October, 2015. He was resting peacefully in his bed at home with his youngest son and daughter-in-law in Summerville, Chattooga County, Georgia.

Robert was born to Lewis George Holder and Bernadine Hogan on 18 May 1928 in New London, Connecticut. He had an older brother Bernard and an older sister Virginia.

After retiring from the Army Robert worked for the Prince William County, Virginia Sheriff's department and later the Department of Corrections before retiring full time to South Gulf Cove neighborhood in Port Charlotte Florida.

Throughout his military career Robert lived with his wife and four sons on or nearby several military bases in the eastern United States. He was posted at many international locations with his family and some that were too hazardous for military dependents.

He had always been a passionate bowler and avid golfer. While his sons were still young he found time to referee and or umpire at their football, baseball & basketball games. Just five days before his passing he was calling balls & strikes while watching the Mets and Cubs play on TV.

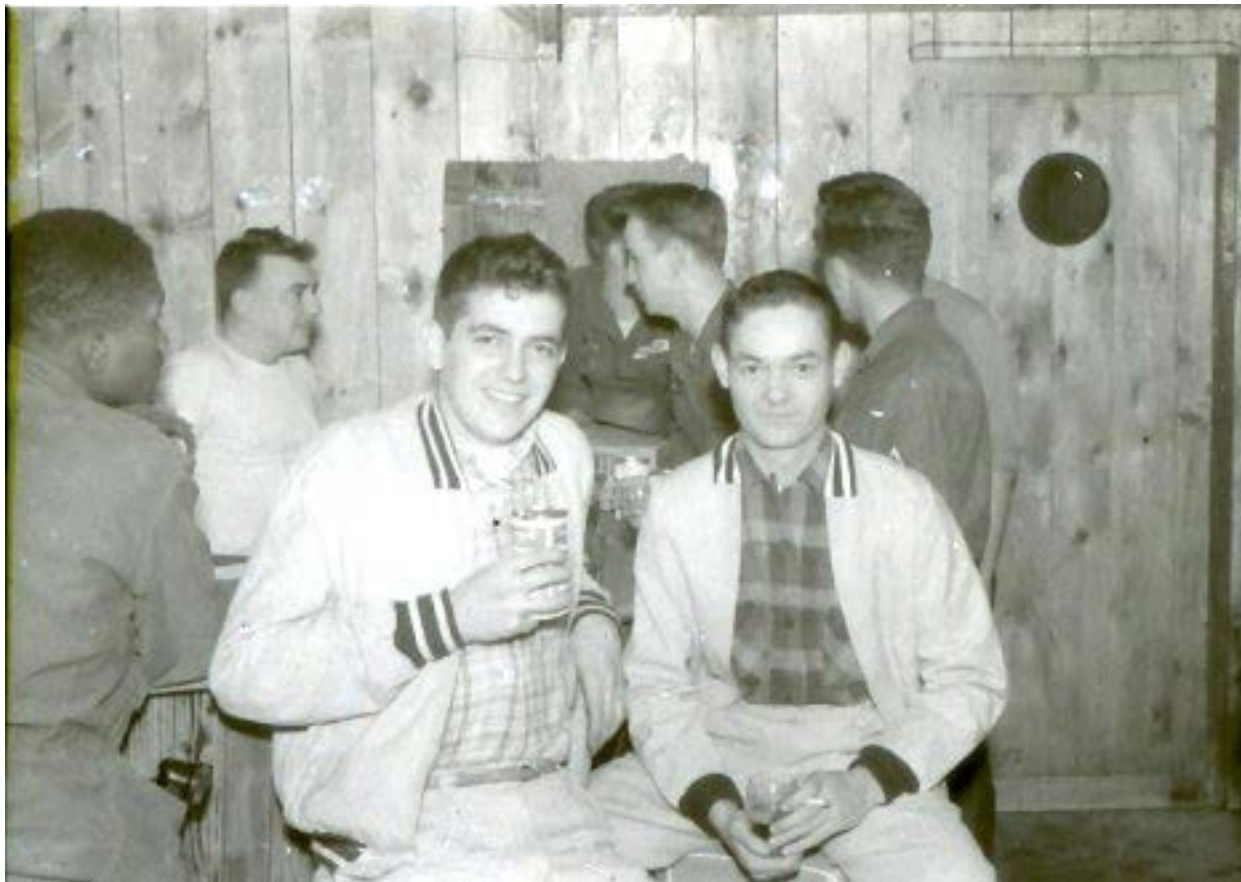

In my haste in DOOL #277 I overlooked the only photo of Camille in my vast files and am including it here. The photo was included in DOOL #136, dtd 19FE2004

Contacted on 15 January 2003. Started off by saying that he has CRS (can't remember shit), but then proceeded to relate his Sinop experience like it was yesterday, but really was 45 years ago. Served 2 years and 9 months on active duty plus about 10 years in the reserves and made E7.

Remembers his MATS flight to Turkey via Bermuda, to the Azores, Tripoli, Rome and Istanbul before boarding a 4-prop Turk airliner to Ankara. Has over 1000 slides that he took in Turkey. Remembers exploring a cave in the Sinop area, possibly with Ray Gill. Enjoys Cajun cooking and his parents sent regular CARE packages to him in Sinop. Remembers the dogs of Diogenes Station and the time in the Spring of 1958 that two Soviet MIGS flew over the post at tree level and the resounding BOOM, BOOM that vibrated everything. Recalls Jim Payette and the rat shit in his popcorn. Also Sgt Mowrey & his Scotch and milk drink. During a visit by a 3-star General - the General was shown one of the huts - and stepped out the back door and fell down on the YELLOW ice. The yellow ice was the way the occupants relieved themselves during the nights instead of going to the outdoor latrine. The occupants of that Jamesway later had to dig a new latrine 18' long, 8' deep and 5' wide. He did not say that he was one of the guilty persons, but believes that one of them was Jim Payette. He related a story about a Charlie Wilder who was a Russian lingie and a native Indian who would get drunk as a skunk and start shooting arrows from his bow from his bunk many times. At least once they had to tie Charlie to his bunk so that he would not harm anyone during those drinking sprees. Charlie was well known for throwing the MILL at his position onto the floor because it kept malfunctioning. Once he did it in the presence of a 3-Star General who had previously fell on the yellow ice. Was a good friend of LT Tom Isophoring and would go to Sinop with him until the CO put a stop to it. Said that he did not want officers hobnobbing with EM during off-duty hours. Remembers that someone in the mail room was opening outgoing mail and taking money therefrom. He reports that he lost nearly \$1000 from that thief. The suspect never was caught. Purchased a 9mm Browning FN pistol from another GI at Sinop with the intent to use it in case Det 4 had to be evacuated. In that case he was prepared to walk out in old Turkish clothes and use the pistol for his defense.

Camille had no paperwork (ben ami) for the pistol and took care in disassembling the pistol and packed it in his luggage when rotating to the states. During a customs check at the Ankara airport - the barrel fell out and he had thoughts of spending time

in a Turk prison. Camille related to me that he will never forget the look on that inspector's face which he interpreted to be saying, "YOU GOT TO BE THE DUMBEST SOB ON EARTH - TRYING TO TAKE THIS PISTOL OUT OF TURKEY!!" Camille promised to sit down and put my jumbled words into a readable BIO and send it to me soon

DOOL#39 dtd 1JA2001: An email exchange between CWO Jimmy Q. Nolan and SP5 Mark Hamilton. Nolan ask Hamilton if he knew the name of the black Captain who was assigned to S4. Hamilton replied that his name was William H. Hardy and that he was later a POW in Vietnam

In was late in the afternoon when I was returning from Saigon, via Bein Hoa, following a truck filled with troops along a highway which I had not travelled before. The truck stopped in a small village, but I continued on because the 1st Division had recently cleared this road - it was a presumably secure area. I passed an American platoon, then a mine exploded near the lead tank and blew a hole in the road. Suspecting ambush, I stopped my vehicle, turned around and drove down the road away from the explosion. Suddenly, about 30 VC stood up and started firing at me. I attempted to evade the gunfire, applied the brakes and skidded across the road. The VC surrounded me and ordered me out of the vehicle; I was in a presumed clear area and they were armed, including anti-tank weapons. I became their captive that day in 1967.

For the next six years the living conditions were simple, crude and uncomfortable. I was moved to several different compounds, all constructed basically the same. The buildings had dirt floors about 12 to 18 inches higher than the surrounding ground to keep out the water; thatched leaf roofs; sides constructed of logs close enough to prevent one from putting his head between them. The cells were small and contained a bed made of bamboo or wood; sometimes we POW's were allowed to make tables. When there was no apparent danger, the cell was locked; if they thought there was danger, we were chained inside the cell and the door was locked.

Due to poor medical aid and worse food, most POW's were sick during confinement. The medical personnel were ill trained to perform any function greater than administering injections. Because of this lack of experience and medical supplies, the POW's I saw suffered from various illnesses including beriberi, malaria and diarrhea. The food was sparse and did not contain much nourishment. I was able to survive on some food that killed others; I had had it very hard when I was growing up, so some of the foods didn't bother me.

Our limited clothing and cold weather also contributed to sickness. I used a piece of nylon to keep some of the rain from blowing through the cracks and into my cell.

The treatment of POW's by the captors included questioning and harassment. After I was captured I asked questions about the military situation; these sessions were usually quite lengthy. Harassment varied a lot; the lower the mentality of the guards the greater the harassment. However the N.V.A. regulars were more brutal than any of the VC. I was never tortured except to have my food taken away from me. In my opinion that was worse than being beaten because we simply didn't have enough food. I've stolen food from the hogs because they were being fed better than I.

In all of our of years there we were never issued any Red Cross packages. I was permitted to write but I know the letters were never mailed. I did receive three letters from my wife all in August of 1970 as part of the propaganda move because at that time a peace settlement was being negotiated.

My internment began while I was serving as a province advisor to MACV Team 91 Special Duty to the USAID Pacification Office of Civil Affairs. There were times when I felt that I would never be released that I had lived my last minutes. If you would speak in terms of a person having nine lives I could attempt to tell you how it feels to have lived all nine of them to the last second.

That is not correct, as I clearly remember that there was one before me, named Bobby, who the EM's used to roll out of bed for P... call
