Reflections on our military service.....

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YOU CAN LEAVE THE MILITARY -- BUT IT NEVER REALLY LEAVES YOU.

This article sums it up quite well. It was written by Ken Burger, of The Charleston Post and Courier: Thurs, March 4, 2015.

Below I've inserted my ASA

I, Elder TC Green retired from the ASA in 1975 and Patty and I have, from time to time, visited an active duty military post and when we drive up to the main gate have been greeted by an imposing MP who looks carefully at my ID card, hands it back and says, "Have a good day, First Sergeant".

In a way it feels good to be called by my previous rank, but odd to be in civilian clothes, walking among the servicemen and servicewomen going about their duties as I once did, 40 years ago.

The military is a comfort zone for anyone who has ever worn the uniform. It's a place where you know the rules and know they are enforced -- a place where everybody is busy, but not too busy to take care of business.

Because there exists behind the gates of every military facility an institutional understanding of respect, order, uniformity, accountability and dedication that becomes part of your marrow and never, ever leaves you.

Personally, I miss the fact that you always knew where you

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stood in the military, and who you were dealing with. That's because you could read somebody's uniform from 20 feet away and know the score.

Service personnel wear their careers on their sleeves, so to speak. When you approach each other, you can read their name tag, examine their rank and, if they are in dress uniform, read their ribbons and know where they've served.

I miss all those little things you take for granted when you're in the ranks, like breaking starch on a set of fatigues fresh from the laundry and standing in formation for an inspection

Some of my friends who served at Fort Devens told me that they missed marching to school in the early morning mist, the sound of boot heels thumping in unison on the tarmac, the bark of Frank Siebenaler's and the sing-song answers from the squads as they kept in step with his left – right foot commands.

To romanticize military service is to be far removed from its reality, because it's very serious business -- especially in times of war.

But I miss the salutes I'd throw at officers and the crisp returns as we criss-crossed with a "by your leave sir".

I even miss the hurry-up-and-wait mentality that enlisted men gripe about constantly, a masterful invention that bonded people more than they'll ever know or admit.

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I miss people taking off their hats when they enter a building, speaking directly and clearly to others and never showing disrespect for rank, race, religion or gender.

Mostly, I miss being a small cog in a machine so complex that it feeds everyone on time, three times a day

Mostly, I don't know anyone who has served who regrets it, and doesn't feel a sense of pride when they see young soldiers in Class A uniforms at the mall and think to them- selves that once that was me showing off my pride that you'd left behind in your youth and willing to serve the Good old USA

Finally Tom Fittante ended with "I wish I could express my thoughts as well about something I loved -- and hated sometimes. Face it guys - we all miss it....

Whether you had one tour or a career, it shaped your life.

GOOD MEMORIES. GOOD MEMORIES. I WANT TO THANK ROY DESRUISSEAUX FOR PUTTING ME IN TOUCH WITH YOU AND THE DOOL WEBSITE. I'M IN THE BEGIN STAGE OF READING THEM ALL. THERE IS A REASON FOR ME TYPING THIS EMAIL IN ALL CAPS. AND ITS NOT THAT I'M USING A MILL. MORE ABOUT THAT LATER! I AM A NATIVE NEW YORKER. WAS DRAFTED INTO THE ARMY AND SOMEHOW WAS DRAFTED INTO THE ASA AND WAS SENT TO FORT DEVENS FOR PROCESSING. AT DEVENS THEY MUSTERED TOGETHER A CLASS OF 10 DRAFTEES TO ATTEND MORSE CODE TRAINING. THE BARRACKS WERE BRAND NEW AND 2 GI'S WERE ASSIGNED TO A ROOM. WHEN I LEFT - THERE WERE 4 TO A ROOM - SO THAT SHOWS HOW MUCH DET 27 GREW.


I TRIED OUT AS A SHORTSTOP FOR THE BASEBALL TEAM THAT WAS BEING FORMED BY COACH LT BOBBY GENE MIZE TO GO TDY TO LIBYA FOR SOME GAMES. EVEN THOUGH I WAS A PRETTY GOOD BALLPLAYER - I DIDN'T MAKE THE TEAM BECAUSE I COULDN'T PUT THE BAT ON THE BALL DURING BATTING PRACTICE. THE RIGHT HANDED PITCHER WAS TED LANGLIE. HE HAD PITCHED FOR MICHIGAN STATE'S NCAA BASEBALL TEAM AND HAD A BLAZING FAST BALL THAT FEW OF US COULD HIT. I'VE OFTEN WONDERED IF HE EVER MADE IT TO THE MAJOR LEAGUES AS HE WAS THAT GOOD.

I DO REMEMBER THAT HE DROPPED OUT OF COLLEGE BEFORE HE GRADUATED. IT WAS DURING THE TEAM INFIELD PRACTICE THAT I GOT TAGGED WITH THE 'SCOOTER' NICKNAME AND IT STUCK TO THIS VERY DAY. AT THAT TIME PHIL RIZZUTO WAS THE NEW YORK YANKEE SHORTSTOP AND I WAS FROM NEW YORK AND WAS TRYING OUT AS A SHORTSTOP - THAT LT MIZE STARTED CALLING ME SCOOTER.

I READ IN THE DOOL ABOUT THE HERETOFOR UNKNOWN TREE PULLER AT SITE 23. THE GUILTY HOOLIGAN WAS A 058 AND MY ROOMMATE. AT THIS LATE STAGE IN MY LIFE I

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DO NOT CONSIDER MYSELF AS BLABBING ON BILL JUNKIN. BILL GOT BOOZED UP AT THE NCO CLUB AND ON HIS SOUSED WAY BACK TO THE BARRACKS WALKED DOWN THROUGH THE FOOTBALL FIELD NEAR THE HQ'S BUILDING AND YANKED THEM ALL OUT. RATHER CHILDISH TODAY, BUT LAUGHABLE THEN. IT CAUSED QUITE A STIR WITH THE POST COMMANDER AND BECAUSE OF IT THE MANZARALI MAULER NEWSPAPER BEGAN AS A FLYER THAT WAS PREPARED IN OPERATIONS ON A MILL AND CIRCULATED THROUGHOUT THE POST. ONCE A FRIEND, BOB KENNEDY, BORROWED IT AND HAD AN ACCIDENT IN ANKARA. CAN'T REMEMBER THE DETAILS OF THAT ACCIDENT, BUT DO REMEMBER THAT WE SOLD IT FOR \$2400. I RECALL THAT ME AND 8 OTHER WENT TO THE AIR FORCE NCO CLUB IN ANKARA ON CHRISTMAS EVE OF 61' TO CELEBRATE AND MISSED THE BUS BACK TO POST. THE ONLY MP THAT I REMEMBER WHILE AT DET 27 - WAS A CORPORAL, THEN MADE BUCK SARG. BIG GUY. ABOUT 6' 5'. REAL SPIT AND POLISH MP WHO ENJOYED HIS JOB.

I REMEMBER DICK RUDELL, JOE KELLY, RUSS DAVIS -BIG BLACK DADDY FROM CHICAGO, DAN BORDERS WHO I KEPT IN TOUCH WITH BEFORE HE PASSED AWAY FROM DIABETES. DAN HAD SUGAR BAD AND WENT INTO THE HOSPITAL IN THE WACO,

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TEXAS AREA TO HAVE A BIG TOE CUT OFF, BUT HE NEVER MADE IT OUT OF THE HOSPITAL SO I'VE BEEN TOLD. HE WAS SUCH A GOOD FRIEND OF MINE. ALSO REMEMBER BILL COWIE FROM CHICAGO, TOM FITTANTE FROM OHIO, BOB WALLACE FROM BROOKLYN, BOOGIE LEVY FROM LOUISIANA AND BOB KENNEDY FROM BRISTOL, PA WHO LATER LOST A LEG IN A CAR ACCIDENT.

I CAN'T REMEMBER THE NAME OF THE 058 WHO WENT HOME FOR THE 1961 CHRISTMAS HOLIDAYS, BUT BEFORE HE LEFT HE TOLD US TO TUNE INTO SUCH AND SUCH A FREQUENCY ON CHRISTMAS DAY AND HE WOULD BE SENDING THEM A MESSAGE VIA MORSE CODE. They had just moved from Ashburn, VA to the Wilmington, NC area. He had previously had most of his stomach removed which ended his life in a Wilmington hospital. His body was cremated and was buried in a Military Cemetery in Wilmington. The Courtney's often attended the ASA picnic' at Blob's Park. Also they attended 2 ASA Turkey reunions in 2008 and 2009.

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This was the 2nd reunion for the Courtney's and Doris said at that time that they will be back in 2011 and that she wished that they had known about the prior reunions.



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The Courtney's served 3 years at the NSA Detachment 120 in downtown Ankara. They both enjoyed the assignment and would go back in a heartbeat as he volunteered to stay a 4th year, but ASA said no!

Chuck enlisted for 3 years of ASA duty at Pensacola, FL in 1951. Took BCT at Fort Knox. Next it was to Fort Devens for training to be a Traffic Analyst. After receiving MOS 1709 was sent to Frankfurt, Germany. After OJT'ing and working the East German military - was sent to Oberamagau in February 1953 for training in the German language. Back to the states for discharge which lasted for 3 months when he re-enlisted and sent to Monterey for Bulgarian language training. This was the first of three assignments to Monterey for language schools, a total of 3 years. The second trip was for Russian training and the third was for Vietnamese. Later he trained in DC for 6 months to speak Turkish before being sent to Ankara and duty at Det 120. After Bulgarian training was sent back to Frankfurt where he married Doris. There was little need for Bulgarian linguists at Frankfurt and he requested to be sent to Oberamagau for training in the Russian language. Instead he was sent to Monterey to learn Russian. Served 7.5 years in Germany. Made warrant in July 1963, three days before he would have been promoted to E7. Surprisingly he was sent to Field Station Berlin in 1972 and in 1975 to Field Station Augsburg. Retired in 1979 as a CW4

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DOOL #233: The Courtney's have attended two reunions and had made their reservations for the Valley Forge reunion and that had to be cancelled when Chuck fell down 12 steps and was rushed to the ER and subsequent surgery. Doris informs that they would have attended more had they known about the prior reunions. Chuck's accident happened at their Berryville, VA home and their new address is: 44435 Cruden Bay Dr., Ashburn, VA 20147 which is East of Leesburg. Chuck is now at home under the TLC of his wife and is visited by a Visiting Nurse on a regular basis. The Courtney's are planning to attend the Pittsburgh reunion in October.

A little background on Chuck Courtney: He was born in 1933 at Summerdale, AL. Enlisted for ASA duty on 4 November 1951 at Pensacola FL. Took basic at Fort Knox, KY and remembers that the Company Commander was a Medal of Honor winner during the Korean conflict. After basic was sent to Vint Hill Farms to await his assignment to Fort Devens. At Devens he completed the MOS 1709 Traffic Analysis Training and was sent in 1952 to Frankfurt, Germany where he worked as an analyst until 1954 when he was sent home and was discharged. After 80 days he re-enlisted and was sent to Fort Devens where he passed the language test and was sent to Monterey where he completed the Bulgarian language course & was sent to Fort Meade with duty at NSA. Subsequent assignments were in Frankfurt where he met Doris Lutterbeck and they were married in 1962 and have 2 children. Chuck is a retired CW4 and according to Doris one of their better assignments was at Det 120 in Ankara. Det 120 was a small NSA detachment

From Larry Jaffe: Chuck Courtney has been in and out of the hospital three times since Christmas. I talked to Doris on Wednesday and he was back in the hospital with what appears to be a serious bladder infection. They have moved into a new house...their new phone number is: 703-726-1693. Obviously lots of doctors appointments and therapy.

Chuck Courtney was a career serviceman who rose to the rank of Chief Warrant Officer 4 (CW4). He was station at Field Station Augsburg in the mid to late 1970's (approximately 1974-79). His MOS was 988A Voice Intercept Tech (Bulgarian), and he served in S3 and Mission Management. He also served at Arlington Hall Station, Field Station Berlin, Vietnam, Turkey, Devens, Frankfurt, Inscom HQ, and the NSA. He became a government employee GS13 and returned in the 1980's to Augsburg.

His passed December 31, 2015 at age 82.

Larry Foster wrote: "Chuck Courtney, long time Field Station Augsburg employee in the Systems Office and a regular at the Augsburg reunions, passed away on Dec 31st."

Chuck was military ... retired CW4 before converting to the civilian ranks. I received an interesting note this morning from Paul Germain:

"I first met CW4 Chuck Courtney when I got to Berlin in Mar 1974. Later I would work with him in DCS Systems (Later Force Mod) at

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Arlington Hall (AHS) where he was a GS13 before he made the jump to Augsburg. We had many conversations on the value of voice vs enciphered comms while in Berlin as well as at AHS." I don't recall every meeting Chuck until I retired and went to work at the Agency, then our paths crossed as we worked some of the same programs. If anyone can provide career details, it's probably Wally Price. "

In turn, Wally Price wrote: "I met Chuck at FSA late 1976, I was a young WO1 and he was a CW4. He was a Voice Intercept Tech, 988A. They departed some time before 1980; I think back to INSCOM Hq. He retired sometime in the early 80's and went to work as a DAC for INSCOM. Came back to Augsburg in the mid-late 80's. I'm afraid I'm a little hazy on the exact dates myself. I'm also a little hazy on his position titles. He was the senior Voice Tech in the Field Station in the 70's, I think he worked in the Field Station 3 section, rather than in 1st Ops Battalion, which is where the rest of us Voice Techs were. It was in mission management, but it had some other title back then. When he came back in the 80's I'm sure he was again working within the (now 701 MI Bde) S3 organization. I've asked the family for a copy of any bio they put together on him, but will also ask for more detail for you. It may take a while, they had just moved to NC, and were still opening boxes when he had to go to the hospital and then died.

I think the S3 section was called the "Configuration Control Board" or something like that.

Besides FSA I know he served in Berlin, in Vietnam, and in Turkey, as well as at INSCOM HQ and NSA.

Thanks for the Chuck Courtney inquiry. Yes I know Chuck & Doris Courtney. I never served at Augsburg or with Chuck Courtney during my 20 years in the ASA. I met them at the annual ASA picnics and at two ASA Turkey reunions.

Chuck served at Det 120 as a CW2 - 1967-70, which was located in downtown Ankara which was primarily a civilian asgnmt for NSA employees. I've talked to (his wife) Doris after his death and the details w/b in DOOL#279

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There was no obituary for Chuck. They had just moved from Ashburn, VA to the Wilmington, NC area. They had bought a new home in Wilmington and Chuck slept only one nite therein and was hospitalized the next day.

He had previously had most of his stomach removed which ended his life in a Wilmington hospital. His body was cremated and was buried in a Military Cemetery in Wilmington







